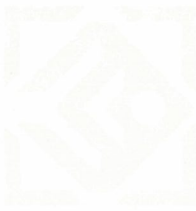

James Thomas Sackville

Categories: Executed Works and
Service to the Community or the Public

Mr. James Sackville graduated with a B.Econ. degree from the Simon Fraser University in 1969 and with a B.L.A. degree from the University of Guelph in 1974. He became a member of APALA and CSLA in 1976 and served as APALA President in 1990/91, followed by two active years on the CSLA Board of Governors.

Following his graduation, Jim moved to the East Coast and, in 1975, opened his own office, BDA Landscape Architects, in Sussex, New Brunswick. For the past 30 years, he has been the Principal-in-charge on hundreds of projects in many communities across New Brunswick and throughout the Maritime provinces. His efforts have included design, development and management of major projects, recreational developments, environmental site planning projects, sustainable community strategies and regional scale tourism plans. He has been an advocate of innovative design solutions for the protection of natural systems and the integration of the project with the natural environment, which has earned him numerous awards.

We have seen the respect Jim is given by both political and corporate leaders, not only for his professional work, but also for his role on the Premier's Round Table on the Environment, the Nature Trust of New Brunswick and the Sussex Heritage Review Board. Direct Service to the Society

Ms. Margot Long is a principal at PVL Partnership Landscape Architects Inc. in Vancouver. She graduated from the University of Oregon with a B.L.A. in 1980 and returned to her hometown Calgary, where she worked for Lombard North and Corush Larocque Sunderland. In 1985 she moved to Vancouver to be involved in Expo 86 with Don Vaughan and Claude Muret at The Landscape Collaborative, a firm that was responsible for Expo's site design and detailing. There she met Jeffrey Phillips and together with him and their partners, built one of the most successful firms today in British Columbia.

Margot has a reputation for providing creative, unique, and innovative design solutions, which build on the projects contextual, historical, and cultural attributes. The focus of her work has been on the reclamation of waterfronts, first nations schools and community facilities, as well as neighbourhood and community planning. Recently she has been involved in B.C.'s most sustainable community development projects, Docksider in Victoria and South East False Creek in Vancouver.

Margot has been a member of BCSLA and CSLA since 1988. She has served on the BCSLA Board of Directors, on several committees, and for five years as its Treasurer. She has continually volunteered her time and presently serves on the Vancouver Urban Design Panel and the Squamish Nations Design Panel, as well as having taught the Professional Practice Course at UBC for 5 years.

Donald James Paterson

Administrative Professional Work in Public Agency

Mr. Jim Paterson graduated from the University of Manitoba with a BA (Geography) degree in 1977, and a MLA degree in 1982. He became a member of MALA and CSLA in 1984. He has served on MALA Council for 12 years in virtually every capacity, including President, while also chairing numerous committees. During his MALA Presidency, he led the Association to its first extensive Strategic Plan.

As President of the CSLA, Jim has been passionate in his Urban Agenda initiative, remaining dedicated to elevating the role of landscape architecture in the planning and design of Canada's cities and communities. His foresight, exemplary leadership, and exceptional management skills have had a profound positive impact on the profession and the Society.

Jim began his professional career with the Lombard North Group in 1982. He has been with the City of Winnipeg since 1988, and is currently the Manager of Economic Development. His primary roles include expediting development within the Downtown, while facilitating economic development opportunities city-wide. Using his "creative problem solving" skills, he has established credibility as a landscape architect with the administration, City Council, and the business community.

Jim has been recognized with CSLA Awards for his work on both the Seine River Greenway and the Red River Corridor Studies, while also receiving a Premier's Award for Design Excellence for the River Road Heritage Parkway.

We are very pleased to recognize Jim Paterson's outstanding contributions to our profession over the past 21 years and warmly welcome him into the College of Fellows.

**The CSLA/AAPC College of Fellows
A Brief History**

The first Fellows were elected in 1964, followed by almost annual additions averaging three Fellows per year. By 1979, over 30 members had been honored by election to Fellowship and it was time to formalize the structure and process. At CSLA/AAPC Congress '79 in Charlottetown, the 'College of Fellows' was established. Specific 'Rules for the Conduct of Operations' were adopted, outlining the structure and operation of the College and the guidelines for advancement of members to Fellowship.

The College's Executive Committee is responsible for the conduct of affairs, consisting of the Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary-Treasurer, and the President of the Landscape Architecture Canada Foundation (LACF), as well as the CSLA/AAPC President as ex-officio member. The Annual Meeting of the College is held each year in conjunction with the CSLA/AAPC Congress. An average of 25 Fellows have attended each AGM over the last several years.

Particular attention has been given to the manner in which new Fellows are admitted to the College and the role of the College in the larger activities of the profession and the Society. In accordance with the Rules for the Conduct of Operations, nominations to Fellowship may be presented to the College by the component organizations and/or the Board of Governors of CSLA/AAPC. The final selection is made by a 'Jury of Fellows', consisting of representatives from Canada's five regions (B.C., Prairie, Ontario, Quebec and Atlantic), who are serving on the Jury for overlapping three-year terms. The Fellows-Elect are then ceremoniously inducted into the College during the banquet or other special event of the next CSLA/AAPC Congress.

Other activities of the College and its members involves assisting in the operation of the Accreditation Council, which administers the accreditation of Canadian schools/departments of landscape architecture since 1987, as well as the LACF. Since the 'Campaign of Fellows' commenced in 1988, over \$367,000 have been donated by Fellows to the Foundation. These funds are used to promote the ideals of the profession of landscape architecture through research and scholarship grants.

In recent years a special effort has been made to establish a profile record on each Fellow, in order to have such information available for present and future generations of landscape architects. Presently, these records are on file for 80% of Fellows.

Since the inception of CSLA/AAPC in 1934, a total of 145 Fellows have been elected, 14 of whom are now deceased.

Criteria for Election to CSLA/AAPC Fellowship

Election to Fellow is the highest honour the CSLA/AAPC bestows on its members Fellowship is the recognition of members who have made outstanding contributions to the profession over an extended period of time in one or more of the following categories:

- Executed Works of Landscape Architecture
- Administrative Professional Work in Public Agencies
- Professional University Instruction
- Professional Writing
- Service to the Community or the Public on behalf of the Society
- Direct Service to the Society

Other requirements for election are a minimum of twelve (12) years uninterrupted membership in the Society, strictly enforced confidentiality of nomination and a confirmative 75% majority vote by the Jury of Fellows. Outstanding contributions are generally considered as contributions which are above and beyond those provided by a member of the profession. Particular attention is paid to those practitioners who have made nationally or internationally recognized contributions.

Jean-Marc Latreille

Category: Executed Works

Monsieur Jean-Marc Latreille graduated with a B.L.A. degree from the University of Montreal in 1975 and was accepted as a member of AAPQ and CSLA in 1978. He served an influential role as a member and Vice-President of AAPQ's Board of Directors from 1987 to 1990 and also chaired numerous committees. Jean-Marc has also contributed greatly to our profession as a long-time lecturer at the landscape architecture program of the University of Montreal. He has been responsible for the highly technical Site Engineering course for an astonishing 28 years.

However, it is as senior partner in the firm PLA Consultants, which he co-founded with Anne-Marie Parent in 1977, that Jean-Marc has made his most significant contribution to the profession. He has been responsible for a long list of high-profile projects of enduring quality. These include well-known Montreal sites, such as the rooftop court and garden of Complex *Guy-Frèau*, the *Maison Alcan* garden, the *Parc des Excluses* in the old Port, the museum of Civilisations in Gatineau, and the rehabilitation of the prime minister's residence at 24 Sussex Drive, as well as numerous urban parks and commercial, industrial and institutional campuses. He has also developed a particular expertise in the integration of sculptures in the landscape and has executed such projects in France, Chile and the United States, as well as Ontario and Quebec.

In recognition of his enduring commitment to high standards of professional practice for the past 30 years, we are honoured to welcome Jean-Marc Latreille as a CSLA Fellow.

Jean-Mark Latreille

Catégorie: Travaux exécutés

M. Jean-Marc Latreille a gradué en 1975 à l'Université de Montréal, se méritant un certificat de l'AAPQ pour l'excellence de ses études.

Il fut accepté membre de l'AAPQ et de l'AAPC en 1977. De 1987 à 1990, il fut membre du conseil d'administration de l'AAPQ à titre de conseiller et vice-président. À ce chapitre, il a présidé plusieurs comités dont celui sur le code des concours, celui de la pratique privée, celui sur la réciprocité, etc. Il s'est de plus impliqué, au cours des 25 dernières années, dans plusieurs dossiers portés par l'AAPQ; mentionnons l'impact du libre-échange sur la profession, la reconnaissance professionnelle, l'admission des cas spéciaux, etc. Coordinateur des festivités associées au 25^e anniversaire de l'AAPQ en 1990, il agit également comme co-président des Fêtes du 40^e qui se déroulent en 2005.

Dès sa sortie de l'Université, il fut invité à enseigner la topométrie, le génie de site et le nivellement et drainage, enseignement qu'il poursuit encore à l'Université de Montréal.

Dès le début, il a pratiqué l'architecture de paysage dans le secteur privé, principalement depuis 1977 chez Parent Latreille et Associés dont il est co-fondateur et où il agit comme directeur des projets en planification environnementale, en design urbain et en gestion des contrats. Il s'est en parallèle fortement intéressé à la sculpture environnementale en participant à la conception de nombreux projets avec des artistes variés.

Ses trente ans d'implication exemplaire et de dévouement à sa profession en font un candidat de choix pour l'Ordre des architectes paysagistes agréés.

Garth Balls

Categories: Executed Works and Direct Service to the Society

Mr. Garth Balls received his B.L.A. and B.E.P. degree from Utah State University in 1976, also receiving the ASLA's Certificate of Merit that year. Upon graduation, he accepted an offer to work at Landplan Associates Ltd. in Calgary, became a principle in 1979 and is currently the owner of the 10 to 12 person firm operating in western Canada.

Garth's professional focus has been site planning and design, and he has undertaken many notable projects for both public and private sector clients. Under his direction, Landplan has been honoured with more than 40 awards by the CSLA, ASLA and other institutions; most recently receiving a CSLA National Honor Award for Shaw Millennium Park, a dynamic addition to Calgary's open space system. In 2003 Garth was honoured as a Distinguished Alumni of the Department of Landscape Architecture and Environmental Planning at Utah State University. As principal of an award-winning firm, Garth has had the privilege of working with many young landscape architects now scattered across the country, and acknowledges their ongoing contribution to the profession.

In addition to directing an energetic consulting practice, Garth served as the AALA representative on Calgary's River Valleys Committee for two terms. He sat on the Organizing Committee for the 2003 IFLA World Congress and is currently serving for the third time on the AALA Executive Council, this time as President.

For his exemplary, continuous contributions to our profession for almost three decades, Garth Balls is most deserving for recognition and election to CSLA Fellowship.

Rudolf Hofer

Category: Executed Works

Mr. Hofer's career began in Switzerland with an apprenticeship in horticulture and landscape construction. He then studied at the Gartenbauschule Oeschberg in Switzerland, where he graduated in 1966 with a Master Diploma in Landscape Design and Technology. In the late sixties he worked in Sweden, France and Switzerland, notably in the offices of Franz Vogel and Intergræn. In 1972 he came to Canada, getting involved in the open space planning for the new community of Erin Mills in Mississauga.

Ruedi became a member of the OALA and CSLA in 1983 and has been practicing in a wide range of landscape architectural disciplines, as assisting professor at the University of Toronto in the nineties, and as principal of PMA to this day. His most notable project is the Husky Injection Molding Systems Industrial Campus in Bolton, which reflects his exemplary environmental design capabilities. He has won numerous awards for his work with Husky, for two of PMA's recent master plans --Port Huron Framework Plan and Oshawa Valley Botanical Gardens-- and for The Lester B. Pearson Garden for Peace and Understanding, an urban courtyard at the University of Toronto campus. In 2001, Ruedi received OALA's Carl Borgstrom Award "to recognize a special or unusual contribution to the sensitive, sustainable design for human use of the environment"...

Ruedi's extensive, highly respected work over the past 35 years is a glowing testament to a very creative, technically superior and environmentally responsible professional. It is a pleasure indeed to welcome him into the CSLA College of Fellows.

Alain Baillargeon

Category: Executed Works

Monsieur Alain Baillargeon graduated with a B.L.A. degree from the University of Montréal in 1978 and became a member of the AAPQ and CSLA in 1980. He has been actively involved with AAPQ and helped organize the CSLA Congress '80 in Montréal. From 1980 to 1985, he was a member of the Editorial Committee for the quarterly magazine ARCHI-PAYS. He served as Chair of the Examining Board from 1990-95, as well as representative to the provincial horticulture and landscape trades federation until 2000. He was also a founding member of the provincial association of garden designers. Participating in different committees since then, he worked on the organizing committee for the ASLA/CSLA joint congress planned in 2007.

Alain established his own professional office, *Objectif paysage*, in 1985 and has made significant contributions to landscape development in Québec through his services to numerous cities, government agencies, as well as commercial and institutional clients. He has participated in many international flower shows including Montréal in 1980, Dijon in 1993, Nantes in 1994, Genoa in 1996 and Québec in 1997, the latter winning him a CSLA regional merit award. In 1995, he received the CSLA regional honour and national merit awards for his project of the Bois-de-l'Île-Bizard Nature Park in the Montréal urban community. In 1997, he was presented with AAPQ's highest honour, the Frederick Todd Award.

In recognition of his many contributions to the advancement of our profession for the past 27 years, we warmly welcome Alain Baillargeon into the CSLA College of Fellows.

Alain Baillargeon

Monsieur Alain Baillargeon a obtenu un baccalauréat en architecture de paysage en 1978 à l'Université de Montréal. Il a été accepté comme membre de l'AAPQ et de l'AAPC en 1980. Dès le début de sa carrière, Alain s'est impliqué activement au sein de plusieurs comités de l'AAPQ. Il a entre autres été : organisateur du congrès de l'AAPC/AAPQ à Montréal, en 1980 ; membre du comité de rédaction de la revue trimestrielle québécoise ARCHI-PAYS, de 1980 à 1985 ; directeur du comité d'admission de l'AAPQ de 1990 à 1995 ; représentant délégué de l'AAPQ à la Fédération Interdisciplinaire de l'horticulture ornementale du Québec (FIHOQ), de 1995 à 2000 ; membre de plusieurs comités ad hoc, dont celui pour la préparation du congrès conjoint de l'ASLA/AAPC de Montréal en 2007.

Depuis 1980, Alain a réalisé plusieurs expositions florales internationales dont celle de Montréal en 1980, de Dijon en 1993, de Nantes en 1994, de Gênes en 1996 et de Québec en 1997 pour laquelle il a été honoré par l'AAPC. D'autre part, il a reçu en 1995 un honneur régional et un mérite national pour le projet du parc nature du Bois-de-l'Île-Bizard de la Communauté urbaine de Montréal. Alain a été récipiendaire du prix Frederick Todd en 1997, pour ses contributions à l'avancement de la profession.

C'est pour l'ensemble de ses contributions à l'avancement de la profession depuis les 27 dernières années qu'il nous fait plaisir d'accueillir chaleureusement Alain Baillargeon au sein du collège des Fellows.
