Dr. Bev Sandalack obtained a Master of Landscape Architecture from the University of Manitoba in 1990 and a PhD in Urban Design from Oxford Brookes University in 1998. She was accepted as a member of MALA and CSLA in 1993 and of the Canadian Institute of Planners in 1997. She has been a member of AALA since 1999, serving as President from 2003-4. Bev is Deputy Chair of Calgary's Urban Design Review Panel and has been Chair and Jury Member of the International Federation of Landscape Architects Student Design Competition since 2004. She was Academic Program Chair of the 2003 IFLA World Congress in Calgary, and served on the Editorial Board of *Landscape/Paysages*.

Dr. Sandalack is Professor and founding Coordinator of the Urban Design Program at the Faculty of Environmental Design, University of Calgary. Previous to this, she practiced landscape architecture with private sector firms in Calgary and Winnipeg, and taught in the Environmental Planning Department at the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design from 1994-99, and in the Horticulture Program at Olds College from 1987-90. Bev is Director of The Urban Lab, an interdisciplinary research centre at the University of Calgary, and with this group and others has received national and regional CSLA awards and an EDRA Places award for seven projects to date, including several book publications on urban design and sense of place.

The CSLA/AAPC College of Fellows A Brief History

The first Fellows were elected in 1964, followed by almost annual additions averaging three Fellows per year. By 1979, over 30 members had been honored by election to fellowship and it was time to formalize the structure and process. At CSLA/AAPC Congress '91 in Charlottetown, the College of Fellows was established. Specific 'Rules for the Conduct of Operations' were adopted, outlining the structure and operation of the College and the guidelines for advancement of members to Fellowship.

The College's Executive Committee is responsible for the conduct of affairs, consisting of the Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary-Treasurer, and the President of the Landscape Architecture Canada Foundation (LACF), as well as the CSLA/AAPC President as ex-officio member. The annual Meeting of the College is held each year in conjunction with the CSLA/AAPC Congress. An average of 25 Fellows have attended each AGM over the last several years. Particular attention has been given to the manner in which new Fellows are admitted to the College and the role of the College in the larger activities of the profession and the society. In accordance with the Rules for the Conduct of Operations, nominations to fellowship may be presented to the College by the component organizations and/or the Board of Governors of CSLA/AAPC. The final selection is made by a 'Jury of Fellows', consisting of representatives from Canada's five regions (B.C., Prairie, Ontario, Quebec and Atlantic), who are serving on the Jury for overlapping three-year terms. The Fellows-Elect are then ceremoniously inducted into the College during the banquet or other special event of the next CSLA/AAPC Congress.

Other activities of the College and its members involves assisting in the operation of the accreditation Council, which administers the accreditation of Canadian schools/departments of landscape architecture since 1987, as well as the LACF. Since the 'Campaign of Fellows' commenced in 1988, over \$390,000 have been donated by Fellows to the Foundation. These funds are used to promote the ideals of the profession of landscape architecture through research and scholarship grants.

In recent years a special effort has been made to establish a profile record on each fellow, in order to have such information available for present and future generations of landscape architects. Presently, these records are on file for 87% of the Fellows.

Since the inception of CSLA/AAPC in 1934, a total of 156 Fellows have been elected, 20 of whom are now deceased.

Criteria for Election to CSLA/AAPC Fellowship

Election to Fellow is the highest honour the CSLA/AAPC bestows on its members. Fellowship is the recognition of members who have made outstanding contributions to the profession over an extended period of time in one or more of the following categories:

- Executed Works of Landscape Architecture
- Administrative Professional Work in Public Agencies
- Professional University Instruction
- Professional Writing
- Service to the Community or the Public on behalf of the Society
- Direct Service to the Society

Daniel Trottier

Categories: Executed Works and
Administrative Professional Work in Public Agencies

Mr. Daniel Trottier is a graduate of the Université de Montréal and earned a Bachelor of Landscape Architecture degree in 1982. He became a member of the AAPQ and CSLA in 1984.

Daniel commenced his work as landscape architect in 1985 in the role of project manager with the Ministry of Transport in Quebec. Since joining this organization, he has been exposed to the world of engineering. His dedication, professionalism, and patience have enabled him to demonstrate the importance of landscape architecture in all stages of planning, preparation and execution of the Ministry's highway projects. In 1998, Daniel became co-ordinator and co-leader of the new approach to the ecological management of the vegetation growing along highway corridors. This approach is now being applied to the entire network of Quebec highways. In 2002, he was named Section Manager of Environment, Regional Planning and Landscape within the National Capital area.

Daniel has won a number of honours and awards in recognition of his originality and the quality of his work, notably the Prix de l'Île d'Orléans in 1996, the award of excellence from the Syndicat de professionnel(le)s du gouvernement du Québec in 1998, and the Transportation Association of Canada's Environmental Achievement Award in 2002. In 2005, he also received the Frederick Todd Prize from the AAPQ.

In recognition of his commitment to high standards of professional work in a public agency and excellence in his executed works for over 20 years, we are honoured to welcome Daniel Trottier as a CSLA Fellow.

Travaux professionnels d'ordre administratif au sein d'un organisme public

Daniel Trottier est diplômé de l'Université de Montréal. Il est titulaire d'un baccalauréat ès architecture de paysage depuis 1982. En 1984, Daniel est devenu membre de l'AAPQ et de l'AAPC.

En 1985, Daniel a débuté sa carrière à titre d'architecte paysagiste chargé de projet au ministère des Transports du Québec. Dès son entrée au Ministère, il a été confronté au monde de l'ingénierie. Par son implication et son professionnalisme, Daniel a fait reconnaître l'importance de l'architecture de paysage à toutes les étapes de planification, de préparation et de réalisation d'un projet routier au Ministère. En 1998, il a été co-initiateur et co-charge de projet de la nouvelle approche de gestion écologique de la végétation le long des corridors autoroutiers. Cette façon de faire est maintenant appliquée sur l'ensemble du réseau autoroutier québécois. En 2002, il a été nommé chef du module Environnement, Aménagement du territoire et Paysage au sein de la Direction de la Capitale-Nationale.

Plusieurs distinctions et prix lui ont été décernés en reconnaissance de son originalité et de la qualité de son travail : Prix de l'Île d'Orléans 1996, prix d'excellence du Syndicat de professionnel(le)s du gouvernement du Québec 1998 et prix de réalisation environnementale de l'Association des Transports du Canada 2002. Mr. Serge Poitras received a bachelor's degree in Landscape Architecture from the Université de Montréal and two master's degrees in Landscape Architecture and in Urban and Regional Planning from the University of California, Berkeley in 1984 and 1986 respectively

As member of AAPQ and of CSLA since 1989, Serge served on the AAPQ Council from 2000 to 2006 and as its President from 2002 to 2005. He is also a member of the Ordre des urbanistes du Québec and of the Canadian Institute of Planners.

As President, he revised the AAPQ strategic plan and contributed to update the general rules and the code of ethics. He collaborated to the profession visibility by being involved in the fundraising campaign committee for the Université de Montréal and participating in founding the Conférence interdisciplinaire des professionnels en design du Québec (CIPDQ), an agency whose purpose is to promote professionals in design. In 2005, he joined the CSLA Committee on "Growth of the Profession" and became Co-Chairman of the CSLA Congress Committee "Havana 2007".

Serge is President of Plan-Cité, a landscape architectural consulting firm located in Montréal. His practice covers the various aspects of landscape architecture at the national level. In a short term, he hopes he will get more involved on the international scene, particularly in Latin America. He is fluent in French, English, Spanish and Portuguese.

Catégorie: Travaux exécutés - Service direct à la profession

M. Serge Poitras détient un baccalauréat en architecture de paysage de l'Université de Montréal (1982) et deux maîtrises, en architecture de paysage (1984) et en planification urbaine et régionale (1986) de l'University of California, Berkeley.

Membre de l'Association des architectes paysagistes du Québec (AAPQ) et de l'AAPC depuis 1989, il a été élu sur le conseil d'administration de l'AAPQ de 2000 à 2006, et président de 2002 à 2005. Il est aussi membre de l'Ordre des urbanistes du Québec et de l'Institut canadien des urbanistes.

Au cours de son mandat, il a dirigé la révision du plan stratégique de l'AAPQ et a collaboré à la mise à jour des règlements généraux et du code d'éthique. Il a également contribué à la visibilité de la profession en simplifiant activement dans la campagne de financement de la Faculté d'aménagement de l'Université de Montréal et dans la mise sur pieds de la Conférence interdisciplinaire des professionnels en design du Québec (CIPDQ). Puis, en 2005, il s'est joint au Comité de l'AAPC sur la croissance de la profession. Depuis 2005, il co-préside le congrès de l'AAPC 2007 à La Havane.

Depuis 1998, Serge est président de Plan-Cité, une firme en architecture de paysage localisée à Montréal. Sa pratique couvre différentes facettes de l'architecture de paysage au plan national. A court terme, il espère être davantage présent sur la scène internationale, plus spécifiquement en Amérique latine. Il maîtrise couramment le français, l'anglais, l'espagnol et le portugais. Other requirements for election are a minimum of twelve (12) years uninterrupted membership in the Society, strictly enforced confidentiality of nomination and a confirmatory 75% majority vote by the Jury of Fellows. Outstanding contributions are generally considered as efforts which are above and beyond those provided by a member of the profession. Particular attention is paid to those practitioners who have made nationally or internationally recognized contributions.

As the first graduate in Landscape Architecture at the University of Toronto in 1969, Mr. Patrick Li has since been committed in pushing the envelope of the practice of landscape architecture from traditional local scale projects to international regional scale sustainable ecological and urban developments.

As a co-founder of EDA Collaborative Inc. since 1978, he has won over 18 national and international design awards. A member of OALA since 1970, he has made numerous contributions to OALA as a Council Member and Chair of the Awards and Competitions Committee, served on various municipal panels and award juries, been a member of the University of Toronto Alumni Advisory Board and the Toronto Botanical Garden Centre Board. He was also invited as a plenary speaker on the Ontario International Trade Mission to China in 2005, promoting the profession to the Chinese market. Equally important has been his leadership in expanding the scope of the profession through his significant work in large regional scale urban planning projects in China since 2002, that represents the best of Canadian design to the international community.

Patrick is also a committed supporter of education and has served as a visiting design critic for the University of Toronto, University of Guelph, the Beijing Forest University, the University of Waterloo and at Louisiana State University. His work was featured in the Toronto Star and the Life Channel TV.

Mr. Bruce Cudmore obtained a Bachelor of Landscape Architecture degree from the University of Guelph in 1972 and Master of Landscape Architecture degree in heritage, urban design and environmental planning from the University of Virginia in 1975. He became a member of OALA in 1978 and served on OALA Council in 1989-90 as Secretary as well as a member of the Executive Director Search Committee, Fees and Services Committee and the Mississauga Urban Design Awards Jury in 2003.

Upon graduation from Guelph, Bruce worked at Project Planning Associates Limited in Toronto and the UK. In 1978, he co-founded EDA Collaborative with Patrick Li, Ron Tatasore and Walter Keim and was joined soon after by Ted Muller in Edmonton. EDA has offices in Toronto and Edmonton and practices across Canada, Europe, the Middle East and China.

Charles Ken Dockham

After reading an *Jan MoHarg* book while studying third year Architecture at Montana State University, Ken Dockham immediately transferred departments - custom designing his own B.Sc.A. landscape and recreation design program - graduating in 1973.

Then, sponsored by his progressive Regina employer, Ken went on to study behavior-based design at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He graduated with a M.L.A in 1979, and then joined ASLA and NRPA. From an idea hatched in Regina with Jack Walker, FCSLA, Ken helped found SALA in 1980, becoming a member of the CSLA the same year.

He served as SALA President and Secretary, on the CSLA Board of Governors, and on many SALA committees. His fondest memories include helping organize the highly acclaimed Congress '85 in Saskatoon and numerous lively CSLA Board of Governors meetings.

Since arriving in Saskatchewan in 1973, when only a small handful of practitioners had a struggling existence, he has witnessed remarkable growth and respect in the profession. Ken's immigration from Montana to Canada was the start of a now 33-year career as landscape architect with the Wascana Centre Authority - steward of Regina's award-winning 2,300 acre urban park. He is the Authority's Director of Operations, with management responsibility for development, planning, design, project management and maintenance. But Ken is happiest when he is personally visioning, designing and building in Wascana Centre - publicly cherished as *Regina's Gem: a place for people*. In consideration of his long-time achievements, Mr. Dockham is most deserving for recognition and election into the CSLA College of Fellows.

The goal is to promote the profession to Members of the Legislature as a contribution to lobbying efforts for an update to the BCSLA's title act.

For many years, Adrienne concentrated on single family residential garden design, however she recently joined the PWL Partnership in Vancouver, and is now contributing to a number of public open space and parks projects.

After graduating from Iowa State University in 1964 with a B.Sc. in Landscape Architecture, Mr. Patrick Butler joined the City of Edmonton Parks & Recreation Department as a Design Landscape Architect and in 1965 he was appointed Chief Landscape Architect for the Province of Alberta. In 1965 he became a full member of the CSLA. Pat was a founding member of the AALA, and served as its president from 1976-1978.

In 1968, Pat established the firm of Butler, Krepes & Associates, and was president of the firm until 1997, when BKA merged with ISL Engineering and Land Services. He is now Principal Landscape Architect and shareholder responsible for managing interdisciplinary teams.

During Pat's consulting career, he has completed a number of outstanding projects, including the Devonian Botanic Garden, Kurimoto Japanese Garden, Paul Kane Park, and is currently the prime consultant for a new sustainable urban village in Sherwood Park. Pat was instrumental in establishing the Landscape Architectural Technology program at the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology and over the years has mentored many Landscape Architects throughout North America. He is currently chair of the Edmonton Design Committee, a regulatory committee charged with the responsibility of raising the level of urban design in Edmonton. Pat's commitment to community organizations and his ability to represent the profession of landscape architecture has contributed to raising the profile of landscape architects in Western Canada.
